A new Gloster standard

GLOSTER FANCY CANARY COUNCIL UK (GFCC-UK)

AS MANY of the Gloster canary fanciers know the origins of the present-day Gloster canary date back to 1925, when Mrs Rogerson of Cheltenham exhibited some miniature crested canaries at the Crystal Palace National Show, writes GFCC-UK international secretary Mario Zahra. Since then general acceptance of drawings by Mr C.E. Minjoodt (reproduced) were a great asset in helping newcomers to the hobby to visualise the ideal Gloster fancy canary, enabling them to set their sights on a definite goal.

In recent years a cry for an update of the pictorial model echoed not only in the UK but also in Europe and in other places across the world. Many tried to define the latest transformations or evolution of the breed, but obviously, without the final say of the governing body (GFCC-UK), nothing could be deemed official.

This is where the great mechanics of the GFCC-UK come in handy. During the third biennial general meeting held in Leicester, a couple of illustrations were presented to the council. After a long and technical discussion, and with great input from our masters, the set that is displayed in this article was cho-Everybody, without exception, agreed that the

new pictorial is a balanced interpretation of the standard and should last for many years to come.

If one is to examine the new model, he or she will quickly discover that all the main features presented in the original standard of excellence are still there with a slight difference in roundness better known as "type".

To the diminutive it is

It was also decided that the length of the Gloster shall remain exactly the same "to the diminutive". Lately we have seen some shocking exhibits across the Continent with some exhibitors claiming that it is not possible anymore to keep the Gloster short with good type and feather quality.

Well, my friends that is exactly what the challenge is all about. If you hear any statement of this sort, it is only because one is not capable of taking up the challenge and accomplish the desired result. It is incredibly beautiful to see Glosters benched with good type, excellent feather quality and natural colour. That is exactly what the best in show should look like and it will also determine the level of livestock benched in the current show hall.

The points system

Although much of the judging around the world takes place by comparison, the council decided that the point system remains exactly the same as it was in the beginning. If one looks carefully through the list displayed, he or she quickly discovers that all the ingredients listed give a very clear guideline as to what the ideal Gloster canary should look like (see right).
